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Chairperson's Report

It is with deep pride and gratitude that I present this year's Chairperson's Report for First Steps Women's Centre (FSWC). Over the past twelve months, FSWC has continued to deliver transformational services that empower, educate and equip women from all walks of life to lead more confident, connected, and purposeful lives. As Chair, I have had the privilege to witness first-hand the impact of this work—not only through statistics and reports but in the voices, stories, and progress of the women themselves.

A Year of Growth, Inclusion, and Impact

This year has marked a period of continued growth across all areas of our provision. Whether through our childcare services, which welcomed children from 13 nationalities, or through our extensive Wellbeing, Employability, Cultural Awareness and Life Skills programmes, FSWC has remained steadfast in its mission: to provide a safe, inclusive and empowering space for women.

The REAP employability programme continues to break down systemic barriers, with 147 women joining in its second year and over 20% progressing into employment. The breadth of course provision—ranging from First Aid to Leadership & Management—has been matched by a personalised approach, including 1-1 support and life coaching. These outcomes are more than numbers; they are lives changed and futures reclaimed.

In Wellbeing, the Centre delivered an impressive 33 courses to 245 women, 163 of whom were new to the Centre. These initiatives have proven to be life-affirming for many, with the average Warwick Scale improvement remaining at 6 points—demonstrating meaningful positive change in participants' mental wellbeing. Events such as the Talent and Wellbeing Fair not only showcased women's entrepreneurial aspirations but also strengthened our sense of community and connection.

Our Life Skills programmes—particularly the ESOL and Literacy classes which was in partnership with SW College, continue to thrive in diversity and reach.

With over 185 applicants and 161 qualifications awarded, these courses have been instrumental in equipping women with essential communication skills, fostering integration, and boosting confidence. Pre-ESOL and multilingual support have been critical in helping newly arrived participants take their first steps in education and community engagement.

Our Childcare provision remains at the heart of what we do. With an average attendance rate of 72% and robust bilingual support, our crèche enabled more mothers to access education and development opportunities. The adoption of the Reggio Emilia approach and responsive learning topics nurtured children's curiosity and creativity. We are proud of the safe, stimulating and inclusive environment provided, and we salute our dedicated childcare team.

Celebrating Culture and Diversity

One of this year's most vibrant and engaging developments has been the success of our cultural activities and programmes, generously funded by The Executive Office through its Minority Ethnic Development Fund, and supported by Choice Housing.

These initiatives have been instrumental in fostering cross-cultural understanding and building bridges within our increasingly diverse community. Through cultural awareness sessions and our flagship six-week programme, "Cultures Unveiled", participants explored identity, heritage, and belonging in a safe and creative environment. The project culminated in a stunning photography exhibition, hosted both at FSWC and at Connect, part of the Dungannon Enterprise Centre. The exhibition not only celebrated the rich cultural backgrounds of our women but also highlighted the shared human experiences that unite us all.

These events served as powerful reminders of the importance of inclusion, representation, and storytelling. They reinforced FSWC's commitment to ensuring every woman feels seen, heard, and valued—regardless of background, language, or culture.

Strategic Vision and Future Direction

As we look ahead, FSWC stands at a pivotal moment of opportunity. With stability reestablished after funding challenges in 2023, our strategic focus now turns toward sustainable growth, enhanced impact, and innovation in service delivery. The Board, in close collaboration with the Senior Management Team, is committed to:

- Fostering deeper partnerships with educational institutions, funders and community networks.
- Securing long-term funding stability to futureproof vital services.
- Evolving our strategic plan to align with regional economic and social development priorities, including increased support for women entrepreneurs and those with complex needs.

As Chair, I am also keen to explore how FSWC can build further pathways into further education, training and employment, especially through partnership with regional colleges, local employers, and government programmes. We must continue to lead as a model of best practice for women's empowerment in Northern Ireland.

Acknowledgements

The achievements of the past year are a direct result of the dedication and passion of our staff, volunteers, tutors, and the Board. I want to extend my heartfelt thanks to our Chief Executive and leadership team, whose unwavering commitment ensures that FSWC remains a place of hope, healing and growth.

To our tutors, funders and supporters—thank you for believing in our mission. Your continued investment is changing lives.

And to the women of FSWC: your courage, resilience and spirit are the reason we do what we do. You inspire us daily. Thank you for trusting us to be part of your journey.

Chief Executive's Report

It is with immense pride and gratitude that I present this year's CEO Report for First Steps Women's Centre (FSWC). The past twelve months have been a testament to the strength, resilience, and purpose that define who we are as a community.

In a year that continued to demand agility and innovation, FSWC not only survived but flourished, reaching more women than ever before and building strong new partnerships.

The Financial Landscape and Strategic Resilience

FSWC secured funding from a wide range of sources, including The Executive Office, the Department for Communities, the National Lottery Community Fund, Garfield Weston, Choice Housing, and others.

This diverse funding base has provided a level of financial stability that allows us to grow and adapt strategically. First Steps Women's Centre has also developed a strategy to encourage local private sector funding, an area largely untapped by FSWC.

Building Our Voice: A Story of Visibility

One of the most powerful developments this year was the opportunity to elevate FSWC's voice and visibility. With support from Dungannon Enterprise Centre, we were introduced to Lisa McElroy, a PR expert who helped us shape and tell our story. This collaboration culminated in a BBC Northern Ireland feature aired over the Christmas period, highlighting the journeys of migrant women attending English classes at our centre. The segment resonated deeply, showcasing not only their linguistic progression but also the cultural exchange and solidarity being nurtured within our walls.

This national recognition affirmed what we already knew — that FSWC is a beacon of hope, learning, and community integration. Our efforts to promote cultural understanding and connection were further demonstrated through our Cultural Identity and Community Relations Programme, funded by The Executive Office and Choice Housing.

The 6-week "Cultures Unveiled" project, which ended in a moving photography exhibition both at our centre and at "Connect" (Dungannon Enterprise Centre), exemplified how creativity, shared stories, and mutual respect can bridge divides.

Programme Highlights

This year, our childcare programme supported 81 children from 13 different nationalities, a testament to the trust placed in us by a diverse community. Our Life Skills and ESOL courses welcomed over 150 women, with more than 160 qualifications achieved. The REAP Employability Programme continues to grow in strength and impact — helping women overcome barriers to employment and see their true worth.

Our Wellbeing programme, now in its second year of the Lottery-funded VERA's Project, delivered 33 courses and supported over 240 women. The evidence of transformation — both statistical and anecdotal — affirms our belief in the deep healing and empowering effect of our work.

Our counselling service continues to provide critical one-to-one support, and despite the departure of our dedicated counsellor, we are actively seeking funding to ensure this essential service continues without disruption.

This year also brought a number of significant visits which offered us the opportunity to showcase the heart of our work and the depth of our impact.

In May 2024, the Department for Communities Committee, chaired by Colm Gildernew MLA, held a meeting at our Centre — a moment of great pride and visibility for us. We also welcomed Pat Cullen MP, who engaged warmly with our staff and service users.

Minister for the Department for Communities, Gordon Lyons, MLA, visited FSWC in February 2025 alongside local MLAs Deborah Erskine and Keith Buchanan. The Minister was handed a piece of written coursework by a Syrian mother who was studying English at FSWC. The Minister asked to keep the piece of work. He then met the Syrian woman and greeted her warmly and spoke to her in Arabic. This was a very poignant moment.

These visits served not only to highlight the breadth of our course offerings but also to amplify awareness of the additional support services that are the cornerstone of our wraparound provision — including free childcare, transport, counselling, hygiene bank and emergency aid. They affirmed the power of our cross-community and cross-ethnic approach and validated the importance of continued investment in the transformative work of FSWC.

Governance

This year also marked a positive step forward in strengthening our governance. FSWC recruited several new directors, bringing fresh perspectives, skills, and lived experience to our Board. Among them is Svitlana Sukar, a Ukrainian cardiac paramedic who brings deep insight into the needs of migrant communities and healthcare systems. We also welcomed Margaret Martin, a retired school principal whose leadership in education and deep commitment to lifelong learning make her a valuable addition to our strategic direction.

These appointments reflect our continued effort to ensure our governance structure is as inclusive, knowledgeable, and representative as the community we serve.

Looking Ahead

Our path forward is one of strategic growth and continued responsiveness. The diversity of our programmes, our unique wrap-around services — including childcare, transport, counselling, and bilingual support — and the strength of our partnerships position us to do more, reach further, and deepen our impact.

We are currently exploring opportunities under PEACEPLUS and the Heritage Lottery Fund, with the hope of broadening our cultural and community outreach even further.

Our priority in the year ahead will be to invest in our people, enhance our visibility, strengthen our volunteer base, and continue delivering highquality, life-changing programmes to the women we serve.

Final Thanks

To our board, our funders and our incredible staff, volunteers and tutors — thank you for believing in the mission and in the power of women to transform their lives and their communities.

And to the women of First Steps Women's Centre — your courage, your dreams, and your determination continue to inspire all that we do.

Childcare Report

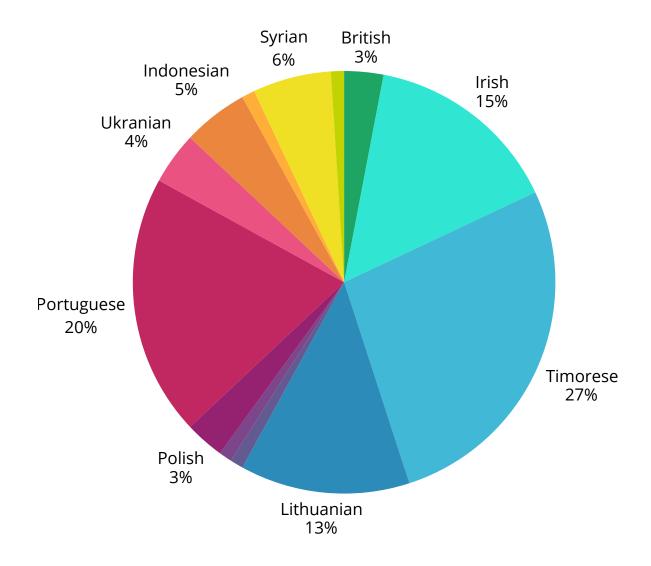
In 2024–25, First Steps Women's Centre Crèche supported 81 enrolled children, of whom 79 attended regularly. Average attendance across the year was 72%.

- 13 nationalities represented
- Parents overwhelmingly positive in evaluations (26/32 returned)
- Social Services inspection confirmed full compliance with no recommendations

The crèche is vital to enabling women's participation in training and wellbeing courses. Some mothers attended up to 14 different courses, made possible by access to safe, high-quality childcare.

Learning Approach - Reggio Emilia

Our childcare provision follows the Reggio Emilia approach – child-led, creative and exploratory. Monthly themes included:

- Recycle & Reuse
- Nature & Flower Study
- Our Five Senses
- Animals Big and Small
- The World Around Us

Daily routines balanced free play, group activities, art, music, messy play, outdoor learning, healthy snacks, and story time. This structured yet flexible environment supports holistic development.



Safeguarding & Quality

The annual Social Services inspection (27th February 2025) focused on the quality of physical environment, monitoring and evaluation. The inspection found full compliance and made no recommendations.

Policies updated in 2024–25 included Admissions & Settling In, CCTV, Safeguarding, Risk Assessment, and Arrival/Departure procedures.

Staffing & Training

This year we bid farewell to long-standing crèche leader Helena Oudiden who departed in March 2025. Our dedicated staff team continue to provide professional and nurturing care, supported by ongoing training:

- Paediatric First Aid
- · Safeguarding & Refresher Training
- Food Safety, Health & Safety, Manual Handling
- Level 1 Makaton
- Level 3 Autism Spectrum Support (10-week course)
- Designated Safeguarding Officer training



Why Investment Matters

High-quality childcare underpins women's participation in education, training and employment. It ensures children from diverse cultural backgrounds are nurtured, supported and prepared for lifelong learning.

Investment in childcare at FSWC delivers a double impact – empowering women and enabling children to thrive.





Parent Evaluations

32 evaluations were distributed and 26 returned. Feedback was overwhelmingly positive, with parents emphasising the supportive, welcoming environment and professional staff.

Some of the comments included:

Cultural Programme

Celebrating Diversity, Building Understanding

First Steps Women's Centre (FSWC) continues to shine as a leading light in Mid Ulster, creating opportunities for both local and migrant women to learn, share, and grow together. Over the past financial year, our cultural programme has brought communities closer, strengthened understanding, and celebrated the richness of our diverse backgrounds.

This work has been made possible thanks to the generous support of Radius Housing, Choice Housing, and the Northern Ireland Executive Office, through its Minority Ethnic Development Fund (MEDF).

Programme Highlights and Achievements

Language Learning for EmpowermentWe delivered 4 ESOL and 1 Pre-ESOL programmes, supporting 145 women to improve their English.

Every participant reported improved language skills, with a 100% pass rate among the Reading Exams and an overall average pass rate of 82.5% for those who sat accredited exams.

"For the first time, I feel confident to speak to my child's teacher without needing help."

Cultural Awareness from the Inside Out

We hosted 27 workshops led by Black and Minority Ethnic (BME) women, sharing traditions, cultures, and lived experiences. These sessions reached both women within FSWC and external organisations, including schools, building mutual respect and understanding.

"I never knew we had so many cultures in our town – I've learned so much just by listening."

Community Events that Connect

Across the year, we held 9 public events, from festive celebrations to International Women's Day, attracting more than 330 people.

Cultures Unveiled

Launched in January 2025 (previously Pictures of My World), this creative photography and storytelling course encouraged women to capture images that expressed what inclusion, exclusion, and culture mean to them.

- One 6-week programme ran with 8 participants (50% BME, 50% local women).
- 87.5% reported greater community cohesion, understanding, and acceptance of different cultures.
- Their work was exhibited during International Women's Day (76 attendees) and at the Dungannon Enterprise Centre, where it was on display for a week, reaching an estimated 165 people in total.
- The course faced challenges: the afternoon schedule limited attendance, and budget constraints meant a second programme couldn't run.

"I see my culture differently now – I am proud to share it."

"Taking photos helped me show feelings I couldn't explain in words."



Human Library Events

Our innovative Human Library model gave people the chance to 'borrow' a human book – a conversation with a woman from a different background – to learn about her story.

Notably, in October 2024, we took the Human Library to the Long Gallery, Stormont, where 15 BME women met with 15 MLAs and senior civil servants. The frank, personal exchanges opened many eyes to the realities of BME women's lives in Mid Ulster.

"They listened to me – really listened – and I think they understood for the first time."

Special Feature: Women in Power

Our Women in Power programme equipped participants with comprehensive knowledge of civic structures at all levels of government. Participants particularly valued the programme's effective balance between theoretical learning and practical application.

The course highlight was a visit to the Northern Ireland Assembly, where participants met with the Community Engagement team and observed a live committee meeting in session.

"I was shocked at how little I knew about our governmental procedures – now I want to be part of it."

"The Stormont visit was fascinating – it made politics real for me."

Women left the programme more confident, more informed, and ready to have their voices heard in civic life.

Making a Difference

Feedback from participants and partners shows the real value of our work:

- 100% of cultural awareness participants reported increased understanding and acceptance of different cultures.
- 95% of event attendees said they had a deeper appreciation of cultural diversity.
- Many local people and migrant women are now volunteering, helping to run events, and actively shaping the life of our community.









Wellbeing Report

Executive Summary

In 2024–25, First Steps Women's Centre delivered 33 wellbeing courses and workshops, engaging 245 women across Mid-Ulster.

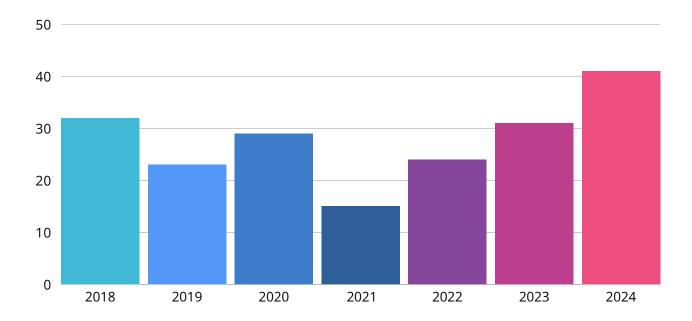
- 163 were new participants
- 454 places accepted across programmes
- 72% retention rate

The Warwick Scale showed an average 6-point improvement.

This improvement is highly significant and should not be underestimated.

Participants reported better mental health, greater confidence, and new friendships. The independent evaluation of the VERAS Project reinforced that engagement reduced stress and anxiety while increasing confidence, positivity, and social connection.

Growth in Wellbeing Courses (2018-2024)



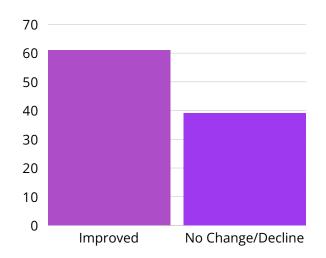
Programme Highlights

Courses included Pilates, Yoga, Drumming, Reflexology Diplomas, and financial wellbeing workshops.

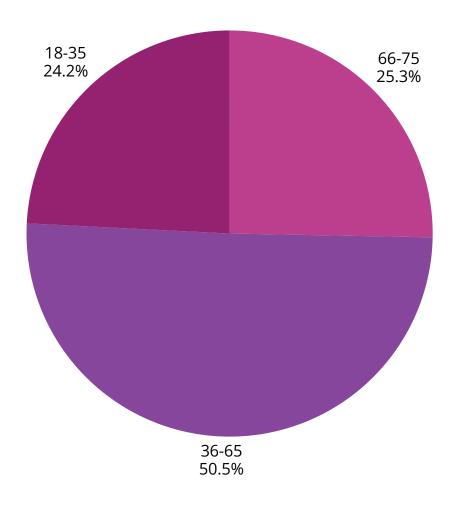

- 83% built friendships
- 74% felt less anxious
- 92% felt fitter and healthier

Investment in women's wellbeing builds resilience, reduces social isolation, and contributes to a healthier, more engaged workforce and potential workforce. Employers and funders benefit through:

- Improved health and reduced absenteeism
- Greater self-confidence and employability
- Social cohesion and stronger communities







Life Skills Report

Between April 2024 and March 2025, 185 women applied to improve their English and communication skills at First Steps Women's Centre. Of these, 153 secured a place across 11 weekly classes, ranging from Pre-ESOL to Essential Skills.

- 161 qualifications awarded (pass rate: 82.5%)
- 67% retention rate across all courses
- 68% average attendance despite significant personal and employment barriers
- Participants represented 17 nationalities, strengthening diversity and cultural exchange in the local community.

This investment in women's education is not only transforming individual lives but also creating measurable benefits for employers, local communities, and wider society.

Recruitment & Participation

Interest in Life Skills training has never been higher. With 185 applicants, 2024–25 marked one of our strongest recruitment years to date, reflecting women's eagerness to learn in a safe, supportive environment.

Class sizes ranged from 12–20 learners in ESOL and Essential Skills, with sessions running 2–3 hours.

Achievements & Outcomes

In 2024–25, women achieved 161 Life Skills qualifications across Speaking & Listening, Reading, and Writing. Highlights include:

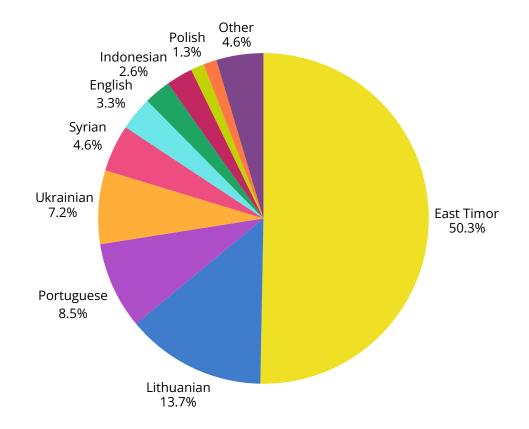
- 100% pass rates in several Reading exams (Entry Level 1 & 2M)
- High achievement in Speaking & Listening (92% pass rate for Entry 2A)
- Consistent progress from Pre-ESOL to higher entry levels

Beyond qualifications, women reported improved confidence in using English daily, better employability, and greater independence.

Diversity & Inclusion

Learners came from 17 different countries, representing a truly global community of women in Mid-Ulster. This diversity enriches local society, and supports employers seeking multilingual, culturally aware staff.

Pre-ESOL

One day a week, Theresa Boyle our Pre-ESOL tutor, worked with students who had more initial learning needs that would allow them to access Entry Level 1 and it's qualification route.

Some students were just new to Northern Ireland, some had a poor experience of learning in their own countries and some were lacking in confidence and would benefit from learning in a smaller group.

This has worked really well for the students with those benefiting wanting to progress at the end of the year.

The students were from Guinea-Bissau, Portugal, Ukraine, Lithuania, Latvia, Syria and Bulgaria.

Building Confidence Through Learning

From April 2024 to March 2025, the Life Skills Programme at First Steps Women's Centre continued to provide vital English language and essential skills training to local and migrant women, supporting them to integrate, progress in education, and access employment opportunities.

Recruitment and Attendance

We received 185 applications for ESOL and Essential Skills Level 1 and 2 in Communication, one of the highest to date. Of these, 153 women enrolled by September 2024, attending classes two days per week in a supportive women's centre environment.

Average attendance across classes was 68%, with the highest retention (100%) in the Pre-ESOL group.

Achievements and Qualifications

A total of 161 Life Skills qualifications were achieved this year, with an overall pass rate of 82.5%.

"I feel more confident speaking to people in shops and at my child's school."

Highlights include 100% pass rates in several reading and writing exams, and strong results across all ESOL levels.

Our Diverse Student Community

Our learners came from 16 countries, including East Timor, Lithuania, Portugal, Syria, Ukraine, Brazil, Morocco, and Afghanistan. East Timorese women formed the largest group (50% of all learners).

Partnership in Essential Skills

We continue to work with Southern Regional College to deliver Essential Skills qualifications. This year, 17 students completed Level 1 or 2 Communication and are awaiting results.

Pre-ESOL Success

Our Pre-ESOL tutor worked with women with the most initial learning needs, including those newly arrived in Northern Ireland and those with low confidence from past education experiences.

The small group setting helped build confidence and many participants expressed a desire to progress to higher levels next year. 6 of these women set an accredited Entry Level 1 exam and passed.

Rural Economic Accelerator Programme

The REAP Programme is aimed to support "economically inactive" women into employment.

The women on this programme, could not be further from being "economically inactive" – the reality of their lives is that they are active mothers, carers, homework helpers, school run drivers, volunteers, confidantes, community builders, and so much more

Their contributions, though often unseen and unpaid, have been invaluable. And yet, when it came to employment, they faced barriers that were not of their making - barriers of confidence, of opportunity, of societal expectation, of childcare & transport.

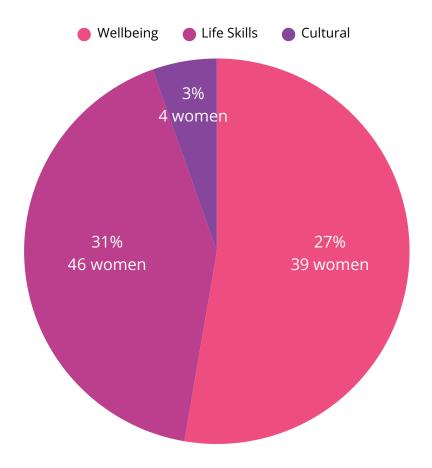
REAP is about breaking down those barriers, equipping these women with the tools, the confidence, and the belief that they already had everything they needed within them to succeed.

In year two of the programme REAP has run 15 courses, promoting both "soft" and accredited skills. Table below shows the engagement per course:

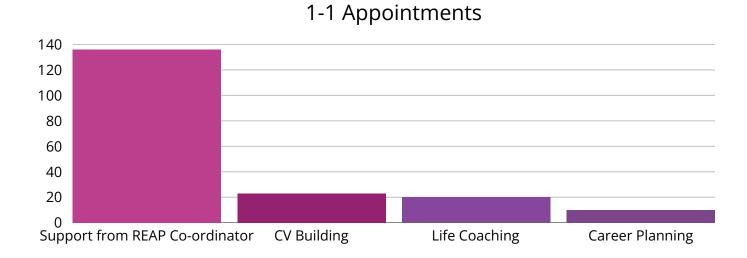

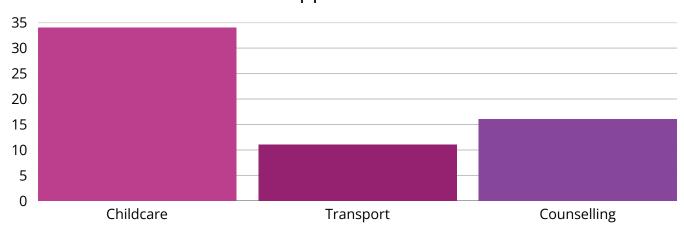


Similarly, the REAP Programme offered 1-1 support for women on either end of the spectrum, offering both CV building sessions and life coaching sessions.



Another core aspect of the REAP programme was the availability of support services for the women. Breaking down barriers to employment, or participation in general, was a priority for the REAP programme and First Steps Women's Centre was able to tackle core barriers through its free childcare, free transport and free counselling for any women who need it.

Craft & Wellbeing Fair (IWD)

The Wellbeing Co-ordinator & REAP Co-ordinator organised this event for International Women's Day 2025. The aim of this event was to give women an opportunity to showcase their skills and empower them through their own abilities, expertise, and creativity. It created a space for them that they might not get elsewhere. 15 women participated in hosting a stall, 10 of whom where REAP participants.





Job Club

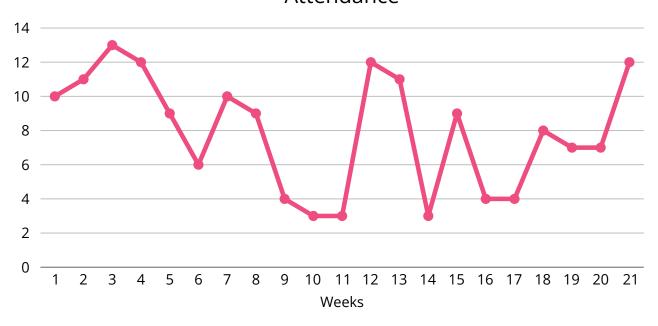
The job club is a weekly session for any women on REAP. Our sessions ranged from job focused classes such as interview skills & job searching as well as sessions aimed at building confidence and personal development. These included routine management, leadership skills, stress management.

Over 40 women engaged in the job club. Below shows the average attendance for the job club sessions.

Outcomes

From April 24 – March 25, the REAP Programme recruited 147 women (in addition to the 70 women from year 1 of the programme). This is a 9% increase on our overall target engagement.

We also maintained the progression target (20% into employment) as we had 20% of our overall participants transition into employment, 11% into volunteering, 4% into formal education & 77% continuing their journey at FSWC.

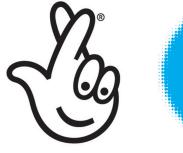
